The prisoners look forward to class because here they are not just a number, here no one despises them, here they are accepted for who they are. In class they are allowed to ask questions, share sorrows and voice concerns. Through His Word they learn to trust and love God and to believe in the power of prayer. Several times they even asked for permission from the officials to introduce me to other inmates who needed prayer. Recently it was a young man who



had just been diagnosed with brain cancer. How heavy his heart, yet how encouraged he was to see the faith of his friends in the Bible Class!

Lawrence recently shared, "Before coming to this Bible Class, I thought I had lost everything and life was not worth living. I was so depressed,

I actually looked for an opportunity to end my life. Attending Bible Class changed me and gave me new hope. Now, I love to sing the song *The Greatest Thing in All My Life Is Knowing You*, because this has become reality for me."

Prison ministry doesn't end when inmates are released. Actually, that is when they need our prayers most. It is difficult to adjust again to society, find a job and be accepted. Even churches have a hard time welcoming former prisoners into fellowship, failing to give them a chance to grow their faith. Jack, a former prisoner visiting us, shared, "I need the church, the songs we sang in prison and Christian friends to support me; otherwise the road back to confinement is short." Praise the Lord! Jack has found an open, loving, caring and accepting church.

Thank you for your support for this ministry, dear friends! Do pray that many would open their hearts to the Gospel and grow in faith, both in prison and after their release!

Sister Edeltraud During a mass wedding, she was assigned to marry a Japanese man also from that group. One son and

two daughters were born to them, none of whom continues in this cult. Members of the "Unification Church" are taught to believe that Sun Myung Moon is the Messiah, fulfilling the promise of Christ's return to earth. This self-proclaimed "Messiah" plays the role of an independent ruler who can do anything he wishes, declaring it as the will of God, with no one daring to doubt or criticize him. Even though Mr. Moon died in 2012, the movement still has 3 million followers in approximately two hundred countries, with many active

missionaries exercising power over the followers.

A few years ago, while employed by the city council of a large town in central Japan, Mrs. Yamane was so busy with her work that she had no time to attend the meetings of this Moon cult. It was during this season of her life, that God was able to speak to her heart and minister to her needs. Together with her Christian mother, she attended services at an evangelical church that preached



the Gospel of Jesus. We praise the Lord that she came to true faith in Jesus as Messiah, Savior, and Lord!

Because she knew that our Sisterhood at Bethel, as well as many prayer warriors here in Kobe, had earnestly interceded for her salvation, her desire was to be baptized at our church in Bethel. Her testimony on July 12, 2015 touched the hearts of the congregation, as she followed the Lord in baptism. Since then, her faith has been sorely tested by the diagnosis of breast cancer, and she is now receiving chemotherapy. Her confidence is in God's faithfulness, as expressed in Psalm 89. Her desire is to be a witness for Christ, whom she trusts for healing.

Mrs. Jong is physically active, and living for the Lord! She volunteers at a hospital where she helps other cancer patients. She regularly attends worship service, serving as an usher. She's involved in the lives of others and reaches people with the Gospel. It is a beautiful thing to behold!

Mrs. Jong's own family has been not so accepting of her newly found faith. When her mother-in-law recently died, this was especially a point of conflict. Mrs. Jong was the only one who was

not on her knees, the sign of attempting to communicate with the dead, during the funeral service. We can only admire Mrs. Jong for her bravery in the face of much pressure from her relatives to comply with this longstanding tradition. Bold actions in the face of opposition give testimony to what one truly believes.

Mrs. Jong's life shows us that she is a true believer and a child of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.
