## Taiwan

Some people hear the Gospel and respond quickly. Others need more time. Still others require earth-shattering experiences. Such was Mrs. Lee. This is her story.

It begins with Mrs. Lee's adult daughter, Sujen, who came to our church years ago. She believed in Jesus, was baptized, and consistently attended church for a while. During that time I visited her family and met her mother, Mrs. Lee. Though always polite, she never came to church or showed interest in the Gospel. Suddenly Sujen dropped out of church and did not attend any other church to our knowledge.

Fast-forward a few years. Sujen had developed cancer. God directed an encounter with Sujen's sister at a shopping center, and I found that Sujen was in the hospital. I went to visit her and met her mother when I arrived. Mrs. Lee told me that she was now praying to Sujen's God. They both promised to return to church, but this never happened.

Several months later, Sujen's condition became critical. The family called us for prayer, but also to discuss possible funeral arrangements. I was able to see Sujen just a few short hours before she died. It was very moving when Sujen, seemingly unconscious, opened her eyes upon hearing my voice.

Our church conducted Sujen's funeral, attended by her family and our church members. God greatly used that time to give comfort and hope. The night-and-day difference between a funeral extolling the Christian hope of eternal life through faith in Christ, and one where the deceased might be sent to any one of eighteen levels of hell, was outstanding. (The Buddhist belief that sinners are subjected to numerous tortures, but are not allowed to die because the ordeal is repeated, began in the Tang Dynasty, 618-907 AD.)



This was Mrs. Lee's opportunity. Shortly after her daughter's funeral, Mrs. Lee said she was ready to believe in Christ. She was baptized and now faithfully attends our church. She knows the truth of I Thessalonians 4:13, that she

**"sorrow not, even as others which have no hope."**

## Japan

### Fearfully and Wonderfully Made!

Makoto Suzuki is the husband of a cartoonist and both are members of our Kotake Mukaihara Christian Church in Tokyo, attending with their two young daughters. Mr. Suzuki came to the Lord last year, just two years after his wife did, as she faithfully prayed for his salvation. He has really grown in his faith, and this is a result of people like YOU praying and sacrificing for this ministry here in Tokyo. Today I want to thank each of you, and share with you this recent

testimony of Mr. Suzuki, showing Christ's power at work in him:



Recently I broke my little toe and was placed in a plaster cast for one month. It was very inconvenient for daily living, but on the other hand, it was interesting to see how our body heals.

Bone healing has three stages - inflammation, repair, and remodeling, with some overlap between each stage. I understand that when a

bone breaks, cells migrate to the site, and there is increased blood flow to that region. This is called the inflammatory stage. Cells and nutrients accumulate at the site and the bone becomes hard. This phase is the repairing stage. Then there is a gradual reshaping of the bone, this being called the remodeling stage, when the bone becomes very similar to the original bone before it was broken. All of this happens automatically without any conscious action by the patient.

Because I am a computer engineer, I understand that everything happens "automatically." This exquisite action occurs because there is a superb program already in each person's body. My genome (all of my genes) consists of about 30 billion base pairs. All human beings have a similar set of genes. Could we make a complicated robot like a human by writing a 750 megabyte program? No way!!

This is far beyond our capability because this knowledge is in God's domain! He is the Creator of the whole universe! He is the Creator of the human body, **"fearfully and wonderfully made"** (Ps. 139:14).

How thankful we should be as we recognize that as great and powerful as God is, He still cares for each one of us, even if it is just breaking a little toe! 🙏
