love and accept their disabled children just as they are.



Our Lord God is more faithful than we can

imagine! Our church started Sunday Worship in Tokyo in 1983 in a small rented house. After another move, God enabled us in 1994 to purchase our present building. This was made possible through prayer and the sacrificial giving of our little flock of about thirty young people, and through the generous support of many of you!

With a 50-seat capacity, this old renovated house soon also became too small. In 2000, God led us to purchase the land next to our property and to enlarge the old church building, doubling the size of our church sanctuary.

However, our building stands at the end of a narrow cul-de-sac, not facing any main road. Another more serious problem we face is the perilous structural damage to our building by earthquakes. One day, the Lord challenged me to "**march around**" our block and ask Him for one of the adjacent properties facing a main street, so that we might expand our base for evangelism, discipleship training, and for sending out church planters.

We believe now is the time to rebuild His church. Imagine, a neighbor came to tell me that his property is up for sale! It was not the house for which I had prayed, but one adjacent to it, facing the same main street. After our church members had gathered on Zoom to wait on the Lord, He confirmed that we should accept the challenge to expand our edifice by two properties! We purchased one property offered to us by that neighbor. The second one, with its crucial location, is not yet available for purchase, nor do we have the necessary funds. Please pray that the Lord's will be done and for His provision for every aspect of this huge undertaking.

As the demolition team rolled in, tearing down the old house we had purchased, my mind and soul were struck with His Word, **"Then the wall of the city will collapse."** There are many walls which must still come down, the greatest being the wall of unbelief in the Japanese heart. **"I have delivered Jericho into your hand..."** is a word to which we cling! Thank you for your believing prayer and support!

Taiwan

Wen Yong has been a part of our church for about ten years. He came to us in a state in which many people find themselves: inwardly broken, and looking for a better way of life. He had been a very successful car salesman, but the price of that lifestyle was two failed marriages and financial debt. He had made a confession of faith at another church, but was not very

grounded in the things of God at the time. We would sometimes take hikes together, and it was then that I got to know him better and could talk about faith and its implications for our daily lives. I encouraged him to read the Word to grow in the Lord, but it was a slow start. He did, however, attend church regularly. After a while, he married a woman from our church who had a similar background. The newlyweds spent most of their time in China where he worked as an auto sales manager, joining the over one million Taiwanese who also work there.

For most of the next several years I kept in regular contact with Wen Yong, praying with him and encouraging him in his walk with Jesus. Because he was away most of the time, he did not have any consistent ministry in our church.



Then late last year he made the decision to return to Taiwan permanently. This time, he turned down lucrative job offers that would have required him to work on Sundays, the most important sales day of the week. He has become an usher, attends a cell group, and is an all-around helper and encourager! I am hoping that he will eventually become my assistant cell group leader, but we wait on the Lord for His guidance.

Wen Yong's life is a work in progress, just like all of us are. Thank you for supporting us as we pray, believe and work to help Wen Yong be all that God wants him to be. It is comforting for both him and us to know,

"He who has begun a good work in you will complete it until the day of Jesus Christ." Philippians 1:6

Mr. K, a medical doctor, does not express his emotions easily. Yet that day, we were so glad to witness his deep appreciation and joy.

According to the testimony he gave, he had tried to study the Bible while in middle school and even went to church. However, it became hard for him to attend, as he got home too late and so was not able to go regularly. He liked to read and listen to stories from many sources, but not

being from a Christian home, he never realized that some of them were from the Bible. It was not until later that he understood these biblical narratives. He also realized that the timing of events in our lives is always according to God's plan. God leads us to our salvation through a variety of circumstances of which we are not aware. This was his time!

I personally am learning not to be discouraged when our service does not produce immediate change. What we do and say will be used by God **in His time**. We should never give up, but keep pressing on. In Isaiah 55:11 we read,

So will My word be which goes forth from My mouth; It will not return to Me empty, without accomplishing what I desire...
