Taiwan

Over twenty years ago, a fellow-missionary asked me to do prison ministry together with her, and my first thought was, "Lord, will I be able to do this?" Soon I realized what a very great privilege it is to walk with these inmates at a very traumatic time in their lives. I witnessed how prisoners were transformed after they had heard the Gospel and invited

Jesus Christ into their hearts. Even though they still had to serve their time in prison, their hearts were free. Each one of them has his own story.



After spending 20 years in prison, can you imagine what it's like to be released into a world that has become foreign to you? William accepted Christ in English Bible Class, was baptized, and soon after was transferred to another prison. He was finally released a few months ago. How long he had been waiting and praying that he would be reunited with his family and be able to hug his now 21-year-old son! But no one had told him that his son had

had a fatal accident in the fall of 2021. William still grieves deeply over this tragic loss. Nevertheless, he tells me not to worry because God will take care of him. Dear friends, please pray for William and all former prisoners as they try to find their way in society again, find a job and a spiritual home in a local church. Even after their release, I keep in contact by praying with them on the phone, sending messages, Christian magazines, and devotional books to encourage them to grow in their faith. It's always a highlight when they come to visit, and to hear them gladly singing the songs we sang in our Bible Class in prison. One former prisoner recently said, "In prison we are just a number, but in Bible Class we felt we still had value. Jesus healed our broken hearts."


The words of Jesus in Matthew 25:36 motivate us to reach out to prisoners:

However, a desire to believe and live in Jesus continues to grow in him.

It is a miracle when one soul gets saved in a land where hearts are so strongly resistant to the Gospel. Taiwan

A potentially new and exciting avenue of ministry is opening up for Liberty Corner Mission here in Taiwan, that being working in partnership with a local group of Christians to plant student-centered churches.

Presently, the church in Taiwan has grown to the point where it reaches unchurched

people with the Gospel, trains its own leaders, plants its own churches, and increasingly sends out its own cross-cultural missionaries. As good as this is, the actual culture of people under the age of 25~30 is markedly different than that of their elders, thus making it increasingly difficult to integrate them into traditional churches. The introduction



of a different model, namely a studentcentered church, has the potential to close the gap and keep the Gospel relevant to the next generation.

I have begun to work together with likeminded Christians in the early phases of such a church plant. In this new project the lead pastor and his assistant spearhead various interest groups in

a local university. My role is to lead a conversational English class. Students who show interest in the Gospel are encouraged to join seekers groups, and after the flame of faith ignites in their hearts, cell groups will be formed. These new believers will become part of the church plant, which is our goal.

In July, I participated in a week-long English Gospel "camp" for university students at another university in the neighborhood of the church led by the founder of this fellowship. If the Lord so leads, Liberty Corner Mission could begin recruiting new missionaries from North America who would connect with this ministry and be part of a church plant initiative that focuses on younger people, but also welcomes other campus staff and their families. We would ask for prayer that we would be instruments of the will of God. It's a tall order, but what better goal could there be in life?

May the Lord bless this new outreach according to His will. Thank you for your faithfulness in praying for our family, our church, and for all our ministries here in Taiwan.

Thanks to your prayers, Mrs. K., was baptized last year at our church. Since coming to Jesus as Savior, she has a clear testimony and confession of faith. Each morning she prays, "Forgive me for my selfish life before I knew You. For my sins, Jesus hung on the cross. I thank You. I need You in my life. I believe in You." Like many Japanese women, she



had always thought that she could not be baptized unless she received her husband's permission. Because of his dementia, he is in an institution, where he suffers from violent emotional outbursts. Mrs. K. could not visit him often because of these sudden outbursts of rage. We kept praying that the Lord Almighty, whose ways surpass human understanding, would work in her husband's

heart so that he would approve her baptism.

One day she received a message from her husband's facility that he had been very calm for a few days, and that he would be able to have a conversation with her. She went to the facility and told her husband of her faith in Christ. And then the miracle of all miracles happened: Mr. K. agreed to her baptism! We are so thankful to the Lord for His grace and perfect timing in Mrs. K.'s life! We would ask you, dear readers, to pray for the salvation of her husband.

An "unreached people group" is defined as an ethnic group among which there is no indigenous community of believing Christians with adequate numbers and resources to evangelize that people group without outside assistance. The Joshua Project emphasizes the urgent need of approximately 2,400 active workers to evangelize Japan, which presently has only an estimated evangelical Christian population of 0.3%. Thank you so much for helping *Liberty Corner Mission* assist us in this church plant here in Sendai!
